II. The Early Church's Jewish Identity

- Jewish Roots of Christianity:
 - The early church was centered in Jerusalem, with Jewish believers maintaining their Jewish identity.
 - Jesus, the "taproot" of Christian faith, was born to Jewish parents and lived as an observant Jew.
 - Early Christians followed Jewish customs, including Sabbath worship, temple prayers, and feasts.
- Scriptural Examples:
 - Acts 3: Peter and John go to the temple to pray.
 - Matthew 15:24: Jesus was sent first to the house of Israel.
 - Romans 11:18: The root (Israel) supports the church.

III. The Church's Gradual Separation from Its Jewish Roots

Shift Toward Gentile Leadership:

- The term *Christian* was first used in Antioch (42 A.D.) as a term of derision.
- As Gentile believers grew in number, the church moved away from its Jewish foundation.
- By the mid-2nd century, Gentile leadership dominated the church, shifting its cultural identity.

• Key Events Driving Separation:

- Bar Kokhba Revolt (132 A.D.):**
- Jewish uprising against Rome, led by Simon Bar Kokhba, who claimed to be the Messiah.
- Messianic Jews refused to join, creating a rift with mainstream Judaism.
- Destruction of Jerusalem (135 A.D.):
 - Roman Emperor Hadrian destroyed the city, exiled Jews, and renamed the region *Syria Palestina*.
 - Jewish believers were exiled alongside non-believing Jews.
 - This marked a significant break between the Jewish and Gentile branches of the church.

IV. Theological Consequences

- Gentile "Gentilizing" of Jesus:
 - Jesus' Jewish identity was gradually stripped away.
 - The church became disconnected from its Hebraic foundation.
- Impact on Christian Doctrine:
 - The church saw itself as replacing Israel, fostering anti-Semitic theology.
 - Sandy emphasizes that the church is not a *usurper* of Israel but a *partaker* in God's covenants.
 - Romans 11: The church is grafted into the Jewish root, not replacing it.

V. Key Principles and Takeaways

- Spiritual Connection to Israel
 - Salvation is from the Jews (John 4:22).
 - The church is called to honor its Jewish heritage with humility and gratitude.

Call for Restoration:

- Sandy calls for the church to reconnect with its Jewish roots.
- Recognizing Israel's ongoing prophetic role is essential for a biblical worldview.
